Dear Commissioner Wade:

I am writing to express my support for the proposed acquisition of Aetna by CVS. This deal would represent a positive development for the business environment in the State of Connecticut.

Prior to the proposed acquisition, Aetna had announced plans to relocate from Hartford to New York City. This would have been another blow to the already-struggling business community in Connecticut. Soon after this announcement, news of the CVS move to acquire Aetna broke, and with that, a statement from CVS that they had no intentions to relocate Aetna from Hartford.

Aetna remaining in Hartford would be great news for individuals and small businesses, which MTAC represents. Specifically, the great news is that the property tax base in Hartford, as well as both the income and sales tax base for the State of Connecticut, would not be further eroded. When large corporations move out of the state, taxpayers like the small business trucking companies MTAC represents are left to pick up the tab. But the damage likely does not end there. If the population decreases and there is less of a demand for consumer goods or raw materials, both of which are transported by truck, it could mean job loss in the trucking industry.

Health insurance customers and prescription drug users may benefit from approval of this acquisition. MTAC believes that approval of this move will benefit the state's business environment as a whole, something that is badly needed at this time. CVS's statement that they intend to keep Aetna in Hartford was like a lifeline to the city, the state, and taxpayers in the state, and Connecticut should take it.
